


# Halton Region Highlights on the 2021 Statistics Canada Census


Census release #6b – Immigration, place of birth, citizenship, mobility and migration

**31,385** residents in Halton are recent immigrants to Canada that have settled between 2016 and 2021.

Immigrants within Halton by period of immigration




Recent immigrants (2016-2021) across the Greater Toronto and Hamilton area (GTHA)




**24 to 44 year olds** are the most common age group of immigrants settling in Halton and the rest of the Greater Toronto and Hamilton area (GTHA).

Citizenship across Halton in 2021




Overall, in Halton, 90% of the population are Canadian citizens and 10% of the population are not Canadian citizens.


**5,820** refugees settled in Halton since 2016 increasing the number of refugees in Halton to **17,945**.


## Place of birth of the immigrant population in Halton in 2021




## Place of birth of the recent immigrant (<5 years) population in Halton since 2011



## Generational status of residents across the Greater Toronto and Hamilton area (GTHA) in 2021




## Growth in first generation residents in Halton, compared to Ontario, 2011 to 2021




## Mobility and migration in Halton

## Migration across the Greater Toronto and Hamilton area (GTHA) from 2016 to 2021



Information presented in this infographic is based on the Statistics Canada 2021 Census and previous Census years. Statistics Canada conducts a national Census of Population every five years. Statistics Canada will be releasing Census findings throughout 2022 in a series of seven data releases. **Definitions:** **Immigrant status** refers to whether the person is a non-immigrant, immigrant, or a non-permanent resident. **Immigrant** refers to a person who is, or who has ever been, a landed immigrant or permanent resident. **Citizenship** refers to the country where the person has citizenship. **Age at immigration** refers to the age at which an immigrant first obtained landed immigrant or permanent resident status. **Generation status** refers to whether or not the person or the person's parents were born in Canada. **Refugees** includes immigrants who were granted permanent resident status on the basis of a well-founded fear of returning to their home country. **Mobility Status** refers to the status of a person with regard to the place of residence on May 11, 2021 in relation to the place of residence on the same date either one year or five years earlier at the provincial level. Persons who have not moved are referred to as **non-movers** and persons who have moved from one residence to another are referred to as **movers**. Movers include non-migrants and migrants. Immigrants arriving between 2016 and 2021 includes data from January 2016 to May 10, 2021. Halton residents that moved in the past year refers to the period between May 11, 2020 and May 11, 2021; Halton residents that moved in the past five years refers to the period between May 11, 2016 and May 11, 2021. Persons who moved "in the past year" or "in the past five years" changed their place of residence as of May 11, 2021 from their place of residence on the same date one year or five years earlier, respectively. **Source:** Statistics Canada.
