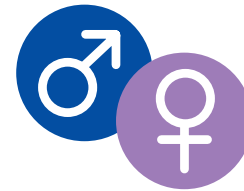
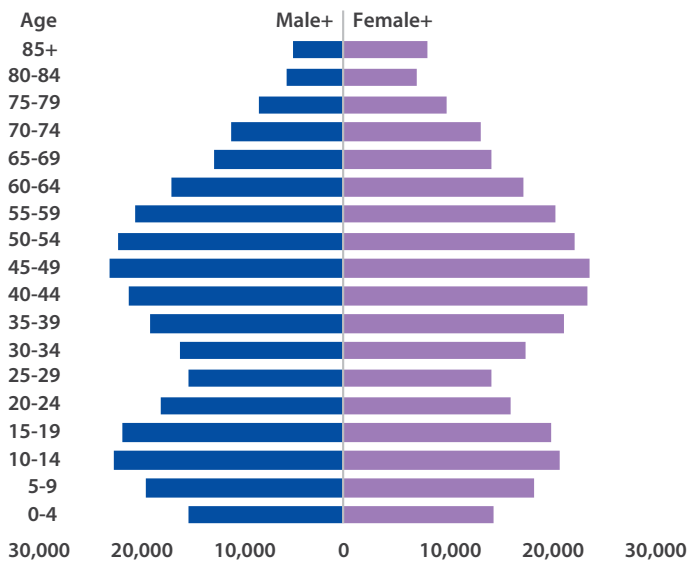

Halton Region 2021 population by age and gender

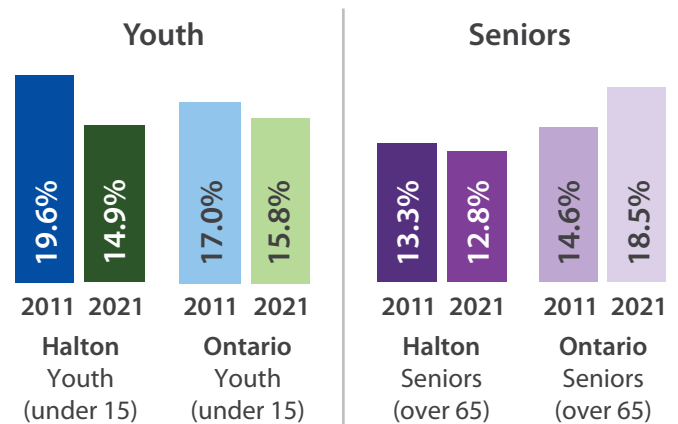

51% Female+ (306,310)

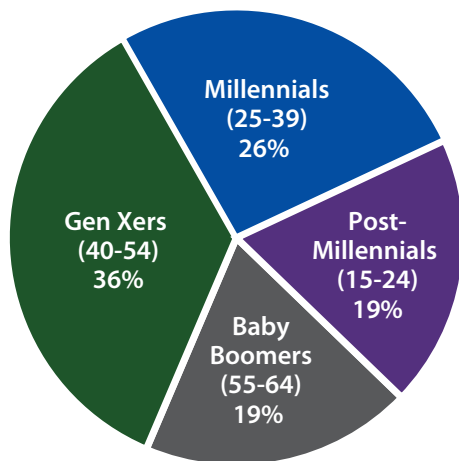
Women comprise a slightly higher proportion (51%) of Halton's total population compared to men (49%). Halton's population was distributed largely amongst the 45-55 year old category with a correspondingly higher teenager cohort.

Unlike provincial trends, the share of children within Halton's population continues to exceed the number of persons aged 65 and older, although the gap has narrowed since 2011.

Halton Region 2021 working age population distribution



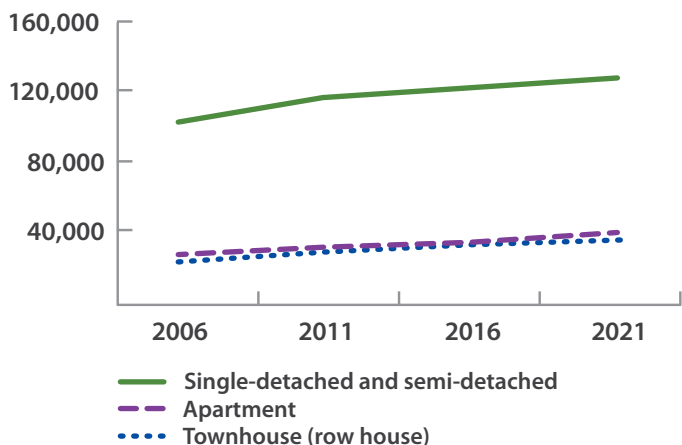
The largest share of the working age population aged 15-64 in Halton was amongst Gen Xers (40-54 year olds), accounting for 36% in 2021. The Post-Millennials (15-24 year olds) now represent the same share of Halton's working age population as Baby Boomers (aged 55-64). Halton had a comparatively younger population within the GTHA particularly within the fast-growing community of Milton (35.2 average age).

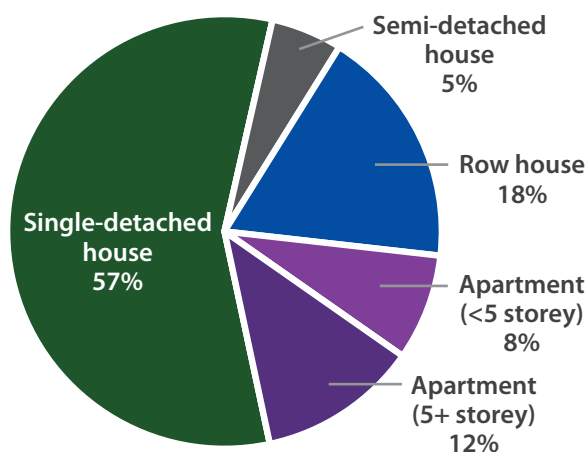
Growth in dwelling types in Halton Region, 2006 to 2021



Over 97% of private dwellings in Halton were occupied by usual residents in 2021. The pace of growth amongst higher density and lower density dwelling types over the past 15 years has been roughly proportional. In 2021, single-detached homes accounted for 57% of all occupied dwellings in Halton.

Nearly half of dwellings in Halton in 2021 were occupied by one or two residents and the average household size of dwellings was lowest in Burlington and Oakville, compared to Halton Hills and Milton.

Distribution of dwelling types in Halton Region in 2021



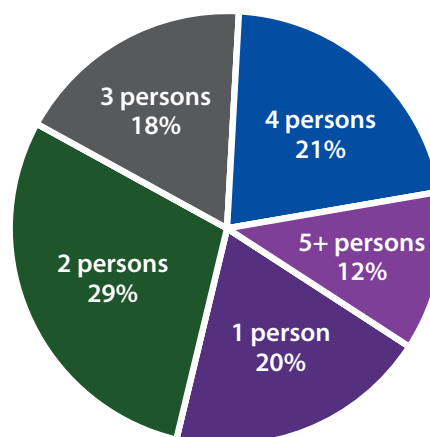

Also included are private dwellings whose usual residents are temporarily absent on May 11, 2021. **Gender** refers to an individual's personal and social identity as a man, woman or non-binary person (a person who is not exclusively a man or a woman). "Men+" includes men and boys, as well as some non-binary persons. "Women+" includes women and girls, as well as some non-binary persons. **Source:** Statistics Canada.
